

### Summary of bird sightings in the Isle of Man, April 2023

**Brent Goose** – A single bird was present around Peel Bay from 8<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup>. Peak count from Derbyhaven and Langness was 78 on 2<sup>nd</sup>. Strandhall saw four present up to 17<sup>th</sup>.

**Gadwall**– A drake was at Langness on 5<sup>th</sup>; followed by pair at Strandhall on 7<sup>th</sup> and again on 27<sup>th</sup>. 27<sup>th</sup> also saw two drakes at Pooil Vaaish.

**Shoveler** – A pair were at Glascoe on 1<sup>st</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>.

**Long-tailed Duck** – The Derbyhaven individual was reported on  $2^{nd}$ ; then after a hiatus reported again on  $24^{th}$  and  $28^{th}$ .

**Common Scoter** – 12 flew past Peel Castle on 26<sup>th</sup>.

**Red-breasted Merganser** – A redhead was reported flying south off Peel on 21<sup>st</sup>. A drake was present at Langness between 21<sup>st</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>.

**Goosander –** A redhead was present on Clypse Reservoir between 4<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>.

**Alpine Swift\*** - A report of a single bird over Ramsey Bay on 10<sup>th</sup>. Another single bird was seen twice over Douglas Promenade on 12<sup>th</sup>.

**Little Ringed Plover\*** – After a bird being present in MBLPOANR early in the month; an individual was found on Kionslieu Dam on 19<sup>th</sup>; then another individual at Pooil Vaaish on 26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup>.

**Purple Sandpiper** – The high count came again from Port St Mary of 21 on 7<sup>th</sup>. Peel saw three reported on 17<sup>th</sup>. On 23<sup>rd</sup> five were roosted on the Sugar Loaf.

**Common Sandpiper** – The first report came from Peel Bay on 15<sup>th</sup>; followed by reports from the Lhen, Kionslieu, Langness and Port Lewaigue. The highest reported count was of four at Poyll Dhooie on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**Black-tailed Godwit** – A single bird was present at Langness from 5<sup>th</sup> and reports continued up to the end of the month.

**Jack Snipe** – Two were recorded near Sulby on 3<sup>rd</sup>; another report of two came from Snuff the Wind on 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Great Skua** – Away from the Calf, an individual has been reported from Langness on 17<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup> – likely the same bird.

**Sandwich Tern** – Regular reports through the month; ranging from Carrick Bay, Castletown Bay, Peel Bay and along the northwest coast. Rue Point saw the highest counts, 42 reported on 25<sup>th</sup>.

**Little Tern** – The first report from Rue Point was of two on 25<sup>th</sup>; with seven reported there the following day.

**Common Tern\*** - A single bird was reported from Rue Point on 25<sup>th</sup>.

**Black-throated Diver** – A single bird flew south past Peel on 4<sup>th</sup>.

**Great Northern Diver** – 30<sup>th</sup> saw a single breeding plumage bird off Peel.



**Hobby\*** - An individual was seen over the Ayres on both 7<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>.

Osprey - Singles seen over Colby on 8th; Regaby on 15th and the Ayres on 26th.

**Cuckoo** – The first report of the year came from Regaby on 8<sup>th</sup>; where one was also reported on 22<sup>nd</sup>. The 23<sup>rd</sup> saw one near Jurby; 25<sup>th</sup> on the Smeale Ayres; 28<sup>th</sup> near Andreas and 29<sup>th</sup> in Ballure Plantation.

**Whitethroat** – First report came of a bird singing at the Lhen on 24<sup>th</sup>; then reports of single birds at Langness, Rue Point and near Cregneash in following days.

**Sedge Warbler** – The 24<sup>th</sup> saw the first report of a bird in the reedbeds at Croit-e-Caley; with reports also from Ballachurry and the Lhen in following days.

**Grasshopper Warbler** – The first report came on 18<sup>th</sup> of an individual near Glen Mooar. This was followed on 25<sup>th</sup> with a bird at Kionslieu which was reported up to 28<sup>th</sup>; the 28<sup>th</sup> also saw reports from the Smeale Ayres and near Ramsey. On 29<sup>th</sup> a bird was heard at the Lhen.

Tree Pipit\* - A single bird was at Ballaghennie on 14th.

Yellow Wagtail\* - A first summer flava bird was at Pooil Vaaish on 24th.

**Whinchat** – A good number of records of this infrequently reported species. The first record came from near Sulby on 20<sup>th</sup>; then individuals at Pooil Vaaish on 24<sup>th</sup>; Point of Ayre on 26<sup>th</sup>; Langness on 27<sup>th</sup> and Patrick on 29<sup>th</sup>.

Fieldfare – A late departing flock of 106 was seen near Sulby on 10<sup>th</sup>.

**Redwing** – One was seen at Silverdale on 1<sup>st</sup>; then three among the previously mentioned Fieldfare flock on 10<sup>th</sup>.

**Tree Sparrow\*** - An individual was seen in an Andreas garden on 7<sup>th</sup>.

Crossbill – At least two were present in Kerrowdhoo Plantation on 25<sup>th</sup>.



### Calf of Man Interesting Sightings, April 2023

**Cuckoo** – The first of the year was recorded on 21<sup>st</sup>; followed by three on 22<sup>nd</sup> and two on 24<sup>th</sup>.

**Stock Dove** – A single sighting of one on 6<sup>th</sup>.

**Common Sandpiper** – The  $22^{nd}$  saw the first of the year when two were seen; followed by singles on  $25^{th}$ ,  $26^{th}$  &  $30^{th}$ .

**Great Skua** – The first sighting on the single bird came on 15<sup>th</sup>; and recorded regularly thereafter.

**Puffin** – singles were recorded on 2<sup>nd</sup> & 17<sup>th</sup>.

Merlin – a relatively late bird on 8th.

Swallow – peak count during the month was 45 on 24th.

**Willow Warbler** – The highest count for the month was 90 on 27<sup>th</sup>; of which 79 were caught and ringed.

Ring Ouzel – A single record of one bird on 18<sup>th</sup>.

**Redwing** – Single birds were recorded on 20<sup>th</sup>; 24<sup>th</sup> & 30<sup>th</sup>.

Fieldfare – Several late records of Fieldfare; with five present on 27<sup>th</sup> and the last a single on 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Spotted Flycatcher** – The first of the year was an early record; a bird caught and ringed on 27<sup>th</sup>. The earliest arrival date since 2007 and only fifth ever April record for the Calf.

Redstart – Records of one on 17<sup>th</sup>; then two on 22<sup>nd</sup>; three on 23<sup>rd</sup> and one on 24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup>.

**Grasshopper Warbler** – Three on 18<sup>th</sup> were the first for the year; with a single on 27<sup>th</sup>.

**Blackcap** – peak count was 40 on 18<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup>, with 35 recorded on three other dates.

**Sedge Warbler** – The first of the year came on 23<sup>rd</sup> when two were recorded; the highest count reaching 10 on 28<sup>th</sup>.

Whitethroat – The 22<sup>nd</sup> saw the first record of two, the 28<sup>th</sup> seeing the highest count of nine.

**Treecreeper** – A single was ringed on 4<sup>th</sup>; and seen again on 6<sup>th</sup>.

**Wheatear** – main movements were 144 on 18<sup>th</sup> and 150 on 20<sup>th</sup>, mostly involving 'Greenland' race birds.

Tree Pipit\* - Single birds were recorded on 28th and 29th.

Twite – A single bird was recorded on 5<sup>th</sup>.

Yellowhammer\* - An individual was seen on 4th.
